

Where can I learn about
being "more Christian"?

What is Christian
initiation?

A Christian initiation is the process of preparing for and receiving the three sacraments of initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. Those baptized as



infants receive these sacraments over years—Eucharist at around the age of seven, and Confirmation anywhere between seven and sixteen. But in the ancient Church, these sacraments were received together. That still happens for adults who wish to become Christians. Their preparation may last one or more years; they learn about and apprentice in a life of faith in the community before receiving all three sacraments at once, usually at the Easter Vigil, on the night before Easter. This process is known as the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. Adults baptized in other Christian traditions prepare to be received into the full communion of the Catholic Church and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist. Depending on their background, this preparation may take a few or many months.

Saint Michael Radio ~ *FM 97.1 "Sharing the Splendor of Truth"

I returned from the USCCB Spring meeting on Friday of last week. The meeting ended up being a bit more interesting than the agenda indicated it would be, mostly around immigration issues and a decision regarding providing for some kind of updating to the *Faithful Citizenship* document as a guide for voters for the 2020 elections.

Cardinal DiNardo began the meeting with the reading of a statement that received the universal applause of the bishops gathered, which read:

"At its core, asylum is an instrument to preserve the right to life. The Attorney General's recent decision elicits deep concern because it potentially strips asylum from many women who lack adequate protection. These vulnerable women will now face return to the extreme dangers of domestic violence in their home country. This decision negates decades of precedents that have provided protection to women fleeing domestic violence. Unless overturned, the decision will erode the capacity of asylum to save lives, particularly in cases that involve asylum seekers who are persecuted by private actors. We urge courts and policy makers to respect and enhance, not erode, the potential of our asylum system to preserve and protect the right to life.

Additionally, I join Bishop Joe Vásquez, Chairman of USCCB's Committee on Migration, in condemning the continued use of family separation at the U.S./Mexico border as an implementation of the Administration's zero tolerance policy. Our government has the discretion in our laws to ensure that young children are not separated from their parents and exposed to irreparable harm and trauma. Families are the foundational element of our society and they must be able to stay together. While protecting our borders is important, we can and must do better as a government, and as a society, to find other ways to ensure that safety. Separating babies from their mothers is not the answer and is immoral."

I fully support what Cardinal asserts in his statement. While the policy evidently dates back to the George Bush presidency, increased in intensity under the Obama presidency, it strikes me that it is being politicized today in a way that it was not prior to present day.

Updated Colorectal Cancer Screening Guideline



On May 30, 2018, the American Cancer Society updated its colorectal cancer screening guideline for people of average risk.

In the new guideline, the American Cancer Society recommends that people of average risk of colorectal cancer start regular screening at age 45, instead of at age 50 as recommended in the previous guideline.

This can be done either with a test that looks for signs of cancer in a person's stool (a stool-based test), or with a visual exam of the inside of the colon and rectum (also called a structural exam).

People who are in good health and with a life expectancy of more than 10 years should continue regular colorectal cancer screening through the age of 75. For people ages 76 through 85, the decision to be screened should be based on a person's preferences, life expectancy, overall health, and prior screening history. People over 85 should no longer get colorectal cancer screening.

The previous guideline recommended some screening tests over others, but the new guideline does not. However, the new guideline no longer includes double contrast barium enema as an acceptable screening option. Also, the new guideline stresses that when a screening test other than colonoscopy has an abnormal result, that test must be followed with a timely colonoscopy, in order to complete the screening process.

Anyone with high risk of colorectal cancer (example: family history of colorectal cancer) should speak with their health care provider about when they should begin screening and how often they should be screened.
