



Liturgical Bits and Bytes: Kisses What is it about kissing at Mass? The priest kisses the altar.

Twice. The deacon or priest kisses the Gospel book.

We kiss each other at the Sign of Peace. The newly me

We kiss each other at the Sign of Peace. The newly married may show their love "in an appropriate way." What's going on?

The custom of Christians kissing goes clear back to the New

The custom of Christians kissing goes clear back to the New Testament. Paul, by no stretch a romantic, urged Christians to greet one another with a holy kiss (Rom 16:16), and Peter suggested a kiss of love (1 Pet 5:14).

Kissing the altar first appeared in the fourth century. People used to kiss the threshold of the building they entered in respect. At Mass the kiss switched to the altar, which symbolized Christ, the cornerstone of the church. By the middle ages most altars contained relics of martyrs so the kiss honored them as well. Today the priest greets the people with "The Lord be with you," but he also greets the altar—the presence of Christ, and the holy place where Mass will follow.

Kissing the Gospel book carries a similar meaning. We recognize the presence of Christ in the book that speaks good news. The kiss of the altar at the end of the Mass is the farewell counterpart of the entrance kiss.

From the third century, a kiss of peace was given to new Christians after baptism. Today, when the bishop offers peace to the newly confirmed, he imitates that baptismal ritual. A priest who confirms the newly baptized at Easter might offer the same greeting.

Strangely, the rite of marriage doesn't always invite the couple to kiss. If the wedding takes place at Mass, they'll get a chance at the Sign of Peace along with the rest of the assembly. If there is no Mass, the rite never alludes to the kiss. But since

the introduction encourages local adaptations, a little improvisation might help.

The kiss we know best is the Sign of Peace. When the Roman rite was first formulated, it called for a real smack. Society must have been a lot smoochier than it is today. Still, some moderns restrain too much. When a married couple chooses a handshake instead of a kiss, it makes one wonder what sign they're really giving.

When at Mass, prepare to pucker.



death on the Cross was the ultimate act of love. Out of


love, too, he offered to share his beloved

Mother with all of us as our own Mother.

Heeding Jesus' words, "Behold your mother" (John 19:27), we can take Mary into our hearts and homes.

"Do whatever he tells you" (John 2:5). Mary brought others to Jesus by bringing him into the world and talking about him. Bringing others to

Jesus is our job, too. We can follow her example, ask for her help, and be obedient like her.



Why do Catholics believe the Church is Apostolic?

We call the Church, "Apostolic," because it is founded on the Apostles whom Jesus appointed to carry on his work.

Before he ascended, Jesus commissioned the Apostles to baptize and preach the Gospel in his name (Matthew 28:19-20). The Apostles ordained others to carry on this mission, and they ordained others. The Catholic faith has been preserved and handed down to us from the Apostles through their successors, our bishops, who can trace their "priestly lineage" back to the Apostles.

Show others the way to God

God has called all of us to follow him but we are also called to lead. Aiding another's spiritual growth in simple ways can lead others to Christ.

Be on the watch. Ask God to reveal to you those who don't know him. Record their names and commit to praying for them daily.

Go to Mass together. Inviting a friend or someone seeking a spiritual home to attend Sunday Mass with you is a great way to spend time together and show commitment to the faith. Offer prayer cards. Promote prayer and a devotion to the saints by sending an occasional prayer card featuring a saint relevant to his or her life issues.

> Build bridges. Spend time with those seeking God. Show them what a life with him looks like. Invite seekers to dinner, go for coffee, listen to their problems. In other words, be a

Share his love. God's love breaks down barriers and removes prejudices. Act with love toward others. A little kindness may open the door for the Gospel.

John 6:60-69. To whom shall we go?

This reading comes at the end of Jesus' Bread of Life Discourse, in which he explained the meaning of the Eucharist. Jesus said that he is the Bread of Life. Unless we eat his flesh and drink his blood, we will not have eternal life. Many of his listeners left, horrified.

The Apostles were also shocked. The day before, enthusiastic crowds were ready to make Jesus king. Now they were running away and Jesus let them go. He understood that the truth is more important than popularity.

Jesus turned to the Apostles and asked if they wanted to leave, too. Peter,

speaking for the group, replied,

"Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life" (John 6:68). They all recognized Jesus as the source of eternal life. They believed him, even though they didn't fully understand him.

> Followers of Christ know that there is always hope even in times that appear hopeless. We remember Peter's words: "Master...you

have the words of eternal life." With God, we all can have hope. He can bring us eternal life.

Feasts & Celebrations

Aug. 7 - St. Cajetan (1547). St. Cajetan worked to reform the Church by founding the Theatines, a religious order modeled on the teachings of the Apostles.

Aug. 11 - St. Clare of Assisi (1253). Born to a noble family in Assisi, Italy, St. Clare followed St. Francis of Assisi into poverty at age eighteen and founded a sister order to the Franciscans called, the "Poor Clares."

Aug. 15 - Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary (1950). Declared a dogma of our faith in 1950 by Pope Pius XII, the Assumption celebrates

Mary's being taken up into Heaven body and soul at the end of her life.

Aug. 24 - St. Bartholomew (1st Century). One of the Twelve Apostles and the son of Tolomai, Bartholomew is thought by some scholars to be the Apostle, Nathanael, who went with Philip to see Jesus. After Jesus's ascension, he spread Christianity to India and in Armenia, where he was martyred. He is the patron saint of Armenia and Belgium, among other places.

Q Is it okay & to tell a "white lie"?

The Eighth commandment directs us to tell the truth always (Exodus 20:16). While a "white lie" told to avoid hurting

> someone else's feelings may seem harmless, telling lies is never acceptable. Here are some suggestions to help:

"Does this look good on me?" A dishonest "yes" creates the wrong impression in the wearer's mind. Instead of brutal honesty - "You look fat!" - offer a truthful positive - "It's a great color on you." This is "mental reservation," and is better than lying.

"That's personal..." Questions about your personal life, family, and financials don't require explanations, if the seeker has no right to know. A simple, "That's personal," should get the message across. This goes for seeking others' personal information as well (CCC

Tell the truth with love. What is right and wrong is not decided by popular vote. Admonishing the sinner is actually a spiritual act of mercy. "Whoever fears the Lord directs his friendship aright, for as he is, so his neighbor [will be] also" (Sirach 6:17).

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
